





The Geriatric Evaluation and Management (GEM) ward cares for patients with advanced dementia, many of whom have fond memories of being around dogs. Therapy dogs like Luna (pictured) provide companionship, emotional support, and moments of joy to those who need it most.

Delta Therapy Dogs carefully match facilities with the right therapy dog teams to ensure the best fit for patients. Their trained volunteers will offer a pawsitive and therapeutic experience, reducing anxiety, improving mood, and creating a sense of connection.

At the Royal Melbourne
Hospital, innovation isn't
just about technology—it's
about people. With donor
support, nurse-led initiatives
are improving patient care,
delivering faster, more
effective treatments where
they're needed most.

Thanks to the William
Buckland Foundation, nurse
Kelsey Rutland implemented
a Nurse-Led Abdominal
Paracentesis (NLAP) Model of
Care, dramatically increasing
access for patients with
Chronic Liver Disease.

Previously, this essential procedure—draining excess fluid from the abdomen— was limited to five times a week, depending on the medical team's availability. Kelsey's research and training program changed that. Now, credentialled nurses can perform the procedure, tripling capacity and ensuring 100% of patients receive timely care.


When Chronic Liver Clinical Nurse Consultant Kelsey Rutland received the Lynly S. Aitken Nursing Scholarship, she saw an opportunity to transform patient care at the RMH.

For patients like Martin, who requires weekly paracentesis, the impact is profound:

By the Monday before my Tuesday drainage, my gut feels like it's ready to explode, and my breathing is extremely laboured. It worries me to no end that my spot might be taken by a more pressing case... I cannot begin to tell you the relief and quality of the limited time I have left on this earth that the nurses and staff provide.

Kelsey's work has not only improved patient outcomes but has also paved the way for more nursing-led innovations.

66 This scholarship gave me the time and space to focus on innovation while still being there for my patients. Knowing that donors believe in what we're doing gave me the motivation to keep pushing forward.






The Lynly S. Aitken Nursing Scholarship celebrates a true trailblazer.

Teeing up support for dementia research

Thank you to the Double Eagle Golf Club, Melbourne's oldest Hellenic-based social golf club, who raised an incredible \$11,059 for dementia research at their recent golf day.



Dementia is impacting more and more families, and for many club members, it's deeply personal.

Many of us in the golf club are children of migrants. As all our migrant parents get older, dementia is hitting every family, said John Marinopoulos, President of the DEGC.

Recognising the urgent need for earlier diagnosis, the club have chosen to support ground-breaking research at the RMH. Through Professor Dennis Velakoulis, they learned about the Dementia Neuropsychiatry team and their vital work in early diagnosis using blood tests—an innovation that could reduce delays in identifying dementia by three to four years in people over 50.
